

6 Tips for Strong Passwords

Strong security is one of the easiest ways to protect your accounts and personal information.

1

Use a passphrase

Create a password using random words that are easy for you to remember but hard to guess, like GoodDog!SkipsUp7 (don't use this!)



Make every password different

Use a unique password each time. If one account is hacked, your others stay safer.

Start a family conversation:

- Why is it important to use a different password for each account?
- What could happen if someone guesses your password?
- What kind of words or information should we avoid using in passwords?

Use long, strong passwords

The longer your password is, the harder it is to crack. Mix letters, numbers, and symbols or spaces, like mQ8!vR2#Lp7@X4\$Nw9&Ka5>Ht1



Turn on MFA

Multi factor authentication (MFA), like a code sent to your phone or face ID, adds extra security.

Choose unexpected words

Don't use personal information – name, birthday, pet's name, or school. If others find it they may be able to guess your password.



Use a password manager

A password manager remembers your passwords for you, so each account can have a strong, unique password stored safely.
